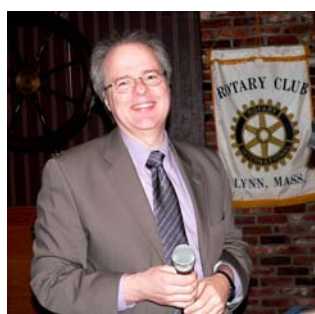

Justin Locke

Author of "Real Men Don't Rehearse" was our speaker Thursday. Several members were heard to comment following the meeting things such as: "That was quite interesting" and "We should get a group together this summer to attend the Boston Pops".

One of his fellow musicians once commented:



"People need to be listened to" and that might have been an inspiration to Justin to change the direction of his musical career!

Justin Locke spent eighteen seasons as a freelance double bass player in Boston,

where he played with the Boston Symphony and the Boston Pops, as well as in pit orchestras for operas, ballets, and Broadway shows.

He is the author of several programs for family concerts (*Peter VS. the Wolf and The Phantom of the Orchestra*) that have entertained



hundreds of thousands of people all around the world. Along with his work as an author, publisher, and speaker, he is also a media producer, the manager of the Bose Philharmonic, and score reader for television broadcasts of the Boston Pops.

Justin explained to us what a "score reader" is - the person that prior to a telecast, marks the musical score with codes that tell the broadcast booth when to switch to camera A or B that is ready to show a picture of a musician playing the flute or the cymbals and only when playing the instruments! "Resting" musicians may be busy blowing spit out of the instrument, not at all what one wants to broadcast !!

* RotaCare Clinics have been in existence since 1989 when the first homeless patient was treated in Santa Clara, California. The first clinic was established by a local Rotary Club. Since then, RotaCare has expanded to nine sites in the Bay Area.
